We cannot understand the Resurrection without grappling with the cause of brokenness and sin in the world. At its deepest root, the cause of injustice, division, violence, evil and suffering flows from the sinfulness of fallen angels and sinful mankind. This Biblical outlook sees within the first chapters of Genesis more than an allegory or "story," with Genesis we see revealed the mystery of iniquity that's tragically affected all of us. We also see, tucked within those mysterious verses a pre-Gospel, a promise from God that offspring from the woman will crush the head of the serpent who instigated such destruction (Gen. 3:15). God the Father did not abandon us when sin entered Paradise, He began a rescue mission. Sin, death, disease, division, and the devil all became targets God sought to destroy to liberate mankind. Jesus fulfilled this mission in and through his entire Life, Death, Resurrection, Ascension and Pentecost. By Jesus' death on the Cross, he bore away the punishment that death is for sin. Jesus took

that place for us, bearing in his body the due punishment for sin. He forgave sin through his fidelity to the Father. Through the Resurrection, Jesus showed the evil powers that wield death that they no longer have sway over those who live in God's Kingdom. The Resurrection is a Triumph over that most ancient of curses from The Fall. Death no longer sends into the land of darkness those who believe in Jesus and have been reborn by water and the Holy Spirit, becoming one with His Bride, the Church. Easter points us towards the power of the Holy Spirit outpoured upon a Church, gathered into the presence of Jesus, who would then carry on the commands and works of Jesus. Jesus reconciled Jews and Greeks in his person, healing a division that kept peoples apart since the Tower of Babel. Jesus freed those bound by disease and the devil throughout his ministry, and by the Holy Spirit he empowered his disciples to do the same; this extends the influence of God's Kingdom into every area of our lives. And the final judgment, which we will all face, shall see the end of the spiritual warfare with the powers of Hell who have only been digging deeper graves with every attack upon Jesus' Body, the Church. What we have, then, with this celebration of Easter, is a promise not only for "tomorrow," but for TODAY. Jesus Christ IS risen. Jesus Christ IS alive. Jesus Christ DOES reign, presently, now! We are faced with a very real choice, then. We can either believe in what he did for us and open our lives and hearts to his Lordship and power, or...we can "do our own thing." As shocking as it might sound, the choices are as simple as they must be decisive: Will we serve Heaven or Hell? We see, in this Easter Season, that all the powers of Hell will remain powerless before the so-called weakness of the Cross of Jesus Christ. Hades could not contain Jesus. Why wouldn't we choose to live only for Jesus Christ? Why would we remain in stubborn resistance? Why do we keep ourselves from his promise of eternal life? How could anyone trade the glory of God for dirt and darkness and death? Well, to choose Jesus will mean giving up "my" way and therefore I will not be my own boss. To believe in Jesus means that I do not get to make up "my" rules, but I need to obey HIS word. In that word is life and freedom from death, sin, disease, and demonic attacks. Will we serve him? Will we let him reign in our lives? The saints beckon us to surrender. The angels cheer us beyond our hesitancy. Why wait? Why play games with God? Choose Jesus. Lay your life down for him. Turn away from sin, repent and believe in the Gospel.

#### **God's Divine Plan**


"God, infinitely perfect and blessed in himself, in a plan of sheer goodness, freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life. For this reason, at every time and in every place, God draws close to man. He calls man to seek him, to know him, to love him with all his strength. He calls together all men, scattered and divided by sin, into the unity of his family, the Church. To accomplish this, when the fullness of time had come, God sent his Son as Redeemer and Saviour. In his Son and through him, he invites men to become, in the Holy Spirit, his adopted children and thus heirs of his blessed life." -CCC 1

This is the first paragraph from the catechism and I think it perfectly sums up what we celebrate today on this beautiful Easter morning. In today's first reading we hear the entire Gospel story being preached by Peter. This is the same Peter who denied Jesus three times just a few days before, and who we read about in the Gospel as not fully understanding what Christ was doing until he saw the empty tomb. Peter then knew the plans of God and could easily and succinctly proclaim them to all people.

The goal of the lenten season is to bring us to a point where we can realize that our destiny is to share in the divine life of God. This isn't just a vague sentimental idea or ambiguous theology, but it is the entire point of our lives. Jesus loved you enough to die on a tree in order that you might receive adoption as his beloved. It seems simple enough, but do we really grasp the depth of the meaning? Easter morning is the good news that not only were you bought back at a price, but that the death of God was not the end. Rather, it was just the beginning. Christ rising from the dead defeated sin and death once and for all and claims us back as adopted children.

This is why Easter is the most important feast in our liturgical calendar. And God wants us to feast. We might be a little rusty after 40 days of fasting, but God wants us to pull out all the stops. I recommend making the nicest dinner you can within your means and celebrate as a family what Christ has done in conquering sin and death. The Easter egg hunts are fun and everybody likes baked ham, but let's not forget the reason for this season. That God desired for you to be saved and come to share in his divine life. This is enough to make even the worst of sinners or hardened criminals rejoice. As John Paul II said often, "We are an Easter people, and Hallelujah is our song." Now go feast!
